What is domestic violence?

West North West Homes defines “domestic violence” as: 'any incident of threatening behaviour, violence and abuse (psychological, physical, sexual, financial or emotional) between people who are or have been intimate partners or family members, regardless of gender or sexuality'.

In reality over 90% of domestic violence incidents are committed by men against women. Domestic violence is a pattern of controlling and aggressive behaviours used by perpetrators to maintain power and exert control on victims.

Some common acts of domestic violence are:

Physical: punches, slaps, kicks, shaking and spitting

Psychological and emotional: harassment, threats, humiliation and isolation

Sexual: rape and coerced sex, refusal to practice safe sex or use contraception.

Who does domestic violence happen to?

Domestic violence is experienced by people regardless of their class, social group, race, age, disability, sexuality or lifestyle. Also, incidents of honour based violence among black and minority ethnic communities are a form of domestic violence. Most incidents of domestic violence are by men against women, although some occur in same sex relationships and by women against men. Domestic violence is rarely a one-off incident and can happen at any time during a relationship or even when a relationship has ended. Violence usually forms a pattern as the perpetrator seeks to hold power over the victim by using violence and controlling behaviour.

Effects of domestic violence on children

Children can be caught up in domestic violence situations in a number of ways:

- Children may witness violence, be forced to take part in the violence, or be directly abused themselves.
- Contact with children can be used by perpetrators after parental separation to coerce women into reconciliation or to cause further distress.
- Living with violence and fear can create stress for children that can manifest itself in a variety of ways; such as poor health, slow development, loss of concentration, withdrawal, and disruptive behaviour. Long term effects may include self blame, low confidence and self-esteem, vulnerability and social isolation.

Domestic violence affects older children in significant ways. A major cause of teenage homelessness is domestic violence and many teenage girls experience violence in their own relationships with boys and men.

How do you report it to us?

- Approach your local Neighbourhood Management Office
- Come directly to the Safer Estates Team (Tenancy Support)
- Report it to any of the Support Agencies
- Go direct to the Police

What will West North West Homes do to help you?

West North West Homes, believes that domestic violence is never acceptable and are responsible for dealing with any reported incident in a way which makes customers feel comfortable.

We are committed to supporting victims of domestic violence or abuse.

We will normally involve the Police and other support agencies because many acts of domestic violence are also crimes, we can also make referrals for emergency temporary accommodation if you feel you are unable to return to your own Home.

Once we receive a report, as part of our commitment to reducing domestic violence we will:

- Act upon any domestic violence report within the same day.
- Involve other agencies, with your agreement.
- Pass on information regarding the report to the Police, with your agreement.
- Provide advice and assistance on what we can do and also what support is available to victims of domestic violence.
- Provide interpreting and translation facilities as required.
- Enforce the tenancy agreement where the perpetrator is a West North West Homes tenant.

The Sanctuary Scheme

We may be able to refer you to The Sanctuary Scheme, which supports victims of domestic violence to remain safely in their home, if they choose. A domestic violence co-ordinator will assess the property to see if it is feasible for you to remain in your home with the provision of additional security measures.

Repairs

Once you have reported an incident to the police and have a crime number, we will repair any damage caused to your home within our standard time targets.

We will change your locks as a priority or emergency repair depending on the level of threat you feel. You will not be charged for the service if you have a crime number. We will also seek to recharge the perpetrator. We understand that you may be worried about the safety of your home, and we will do our best to help you feel secure again.

Financial advice

Your financial situation may change as a result of separation from a partner or leaving your family home. If you wish, we will put a time limited electronic flag on your housing record so that our staff will understand that you have been a victim of domestic violence. This information will not be provided to a third party without your consent. You can also contact West North West Homes for advice. Do not forget to have your income and outgoings details when you contact us so a full and fair assessment can be made.

Ending the violence

While the risk of staying may be very high, simply leaving the relationship, does not guarantee that the violence will stop. The period during which a woman is planning or making her exit is often the most dangerous time for her and her children. Many women are frightened of the abuser, and with good reason, as it is not uncommon for perpetrators to threaten to harm or even kill their partners or children if she leaves.

The resources and support you may need to leave a violent relationship safely include: money, housing, help with moving, transport, ongoing protection from the police, legal support to protect you and your children and emotional support.



Items you should take with you when you leave:

- Keep birth certificates, marriage certificates, passports and medical cards together.
- Keep bank and building society books, benefit books together and accessible.
- Carry driving licence, motor insurance and vehicle registration documents.
- Take rent or mortgage account detail, as well as other important telephone / type talk numbers.
- Plan to take all the children with you (the longer children are left 'at home' the harder it is to get them later).
- Take money, credit cards, spare keys for the house and car.
- Put aside necessary prescription medication.
- Have a bag with clothes, toiletries and toys hidden or at someone else's house.
- Arrange to store personal possessions and valuables.
- Try and have a statement written out and a photograph of the perpetrator (this will help serving court papers etc).

People and organisations to speak to:

- your GP
- your bank
- your neighbourhood housing office
- the benefits agency
- a solicitor.
- Arrange pet care (The Dogs Trust offer a fostering service for dogs until their owner can take them back).

Help is out there!

If you are in immediate danger, you should call 999. The police will respond to all reported incidents of domestic violence.
